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Businesses New tea-bagging technology at ISIS

Centre for Curative Care Receives New Wood Workshop

SEKEM's centre for curative care has just received a new workshop for woodwork training. Five adults are currently being trained in the workshop by one teacher. They produce wooden toys that are being sold in the SEKEM school or at exhibitions in Cairo.

The adults generally carry out most of the steps of their work independently: the sawing of wheels, filing and sanding of the parts and also the oiling with bees wax or natu-

ral oils of the finished toy. The teachers take particular care that the trainees will encounter a diverse set of small challenges during their work including different kinds and sequences of work. In the production of the toys, only local wood is used that actually grows on the SEKEM farm: Persian lilac, Neemand mulberry tree wood. A second workshop focussing on paper production is under construction.

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

ISIS increases tea-bag production, creates workplaces

SEKEMs ISIS, market leader in Egypt in the field of tea-bagged herbal teas, has introduced a new tea-bagging machine in February after overcoming many obstacles and almost a year of preparation.

The new "IMA C27" ist double as fast as its predecessor and increases the production of tea bags for the Egyptian market significantly. The outstanding advantage of the new machine is the lack of need to rely on aluminium staplers for sealing the tea bags. This does not only reduce potential environmental pollution but also the cost for buying and transporting additional resources.

The machine which had only been introduced in April 2005 at the Interpack fair in Düsseldorf, represents the epitome of industrial technological design in tea-bag production. The C27 can produce up to 250 tea bags per minute and is based on a traditional two-chamber tea bag for maximum quality and flavour.

Bombax Tree

The Bombax or kapok tree, botanically the bombax ceiba, offers a spectacular sight throughout its short blooming time on the premises of SEKEM's Cairo branch offices. The huge, Magnolia-shaped buds during this time develop into extraordinarily bulky flowers that, depending on the region, change their colour from light rosé to dark red. The stem of the

Bombax tree is covered with large, cylindrical thorns and the fully developed fruits contain a fiber called kapok that is well-known in Europe too for bed fillings and other uses. The "Bombax" is an excellent example for how exotic the diversity of the flora in Egypt can be, even in artificially irrigated desert areas.



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
